

HPV Vaccine Safety Evidence Mounts

There is mounting evidence to support the safety of HPV vaccines. One such retrospective-cohort study was published last month in the *Canadian Medical Association Journal*, which aimed to assess the association between the HPV4 vaccination and development of autoimmune disorders. The results showed that there was no increased risk of development of an autoimmune disorder for girls age 12-17 following administration of the HPV4 vaccine, but rather the rate of development of autoimmune disorders in the study participants was "consistent with the rate of diagnosed cases among all girls in this age group". This study's results match the results of similar cohort studies previously carried out in Denmark and Sweden. Further studies will be needed to assess the safety of the newer HPV9 vaccine. Zika Virus Emerging Data

Zika virus infection in pregnancy continues to be a hot topic of discussion with new emerging data form a number of studies. One prospective cohort study conducted in the French territories of the Americas looked at the occurrence of severe neurologic birth defects in symptomatic pregnant women with confirmed Zika virus infection. The study results showed that the highest rate of severe neurological birth defects were seen when infection occurred in the first trimester, at a rate of 6.9%, but severe neurological birth defects were also seen when infection occurred in both the second and third trimesters, at 1.2% and 0.9& respectively. These results show that severe seguel can occur with a Zika virus infection that occurs at any point in pregnancy. In July 2017 the CDC updated the guidance for U.S. healthcare providers who treat possible Zika exposure/infection in pregnant women; access the update here.
